# Citizen of The Day...

When in grammer school in Grosbeck, Tex., Robert Renfroe used to get in trouble with his teachers because he would stand up and peek out the window when he heard the high school band practicing.

And he got in additional trouble with his family by frequently slipping off to nearby Mexia to listen to the famous Black Cat band.

,"I believe I always wanted to be a band director," says Renfroe, who now heads the Stingaree Band.

His musical schooling was held up temporarily in high school when Groesbeck was unable to hold a director because of the war. But Bob took his base horn home and did a lot of studying on his own.

#### PLAYED FOOTBALL

He turned to athletics when the band folded and won two leters in football and two in basketball

But after graduation from high school in 1945 he went to Sam Houston State College in quest of a musical education.

After learning to play every band instrument, he came to Texas City in 1947 to head the junior aggregation. Two years netted them two first-division state ratings and Renfroe moved up to the senior high post.

Since Renfroe took over, the Sting Band has been selected to lead the New Orleans' Mardi Graparade and has been asked to make moving pictures which wilbe shown at a summer directors' camp in Colorado. The band also won the highest marching rating in the state this year.

"Next year should be a good one for the band," Renfroe said. "We lose only eight member: while we pick up 30 from the junior high organization. Tha means we will have about 9 pieces in September."

Renfroe, who is 22, belongs to the Kiwanis Club, the Masonic Order, Kappa Kappa Phi fraternity and the First Methodis Church.



The present Texas City High School Band, also known as the Stingaree Band. is six years old this August. As a Junior High School band, which was organized under its present director, it has won six first divisions at the state contest in marching and concert playing, and first place in a national contest held in Enid, Oklahoma when the band was two years old.

As a Senior High School Band it has been a continuous first division winner at the state contest held annually at Huntsville and Houston, Texas. The band was designated in 1950 to represent the State of Texas by Governor Allan Shivers at the Mardi Gras in New Orleans. The Texas City High School Band was the first high school band to march in the new Rice Stadium when it represented the Red Raiders from Texas Tech. The Stingaree Band appeared on other occasions in the Oleander Bowl at Galveston where it represented the Missouri Valley College. The past year it was sent to Mexico City to represent Texas City at the Lions International Convention.

The Band Dept. in the Texas City Independent Schools:

All of Texas City is proud of the Band Department in Texas City. After the explosion in the summer of 1947 Mr. Robert Renfroe was employed to direct Texas City's first junior high school band. In its first year the band made the highest rating in marching that has been made at a State Contest, a 99.3. This rating was not topped by any senior high school band that competed in the various classifications. Later that year the band was awarded first place in concert playing and was one of the three junior high bands in the state to receive the State Interschol-

astic League Special Award. The next strumented for 120 students. It is year the band continued its rise by again winning first division in marching and went on to the Tri-State Contest held in Oklahoma where the Band was adjudged by nationally famous directors Karl King, Dr. Frank Simon and Dr. Cline as first division winner in concert playing. Mr. Renfroe's duties with the senior high band were interrupted for two years while he was with the 4th Army Band in San Antonio and later with the 98th Army Band in Trieste. While he was away the Band was under the capable direction of Mr. Fred McDonald and later Mr. Wade Pogue. Mr. Pogue is now director of the fine Senior High School Band at White Oak, Texas.

The band department at the present employs three full-time directors. It

This year the junior high band is under the direction of Mr. Tommy Jenkins. The senior high band is about 96-pieces and is under the direction of Mr. Robert L. Renfroe. The band department is a dream come true for all who have worked hard and long to bring to the young boys and girls of Texas City a bit of happiness and appreciation for good music while they attend school in Texas City High. The honor and recognition the members of the band have brought to Texas City is keenly felt by every citizen. When the Texas City Bands perform, they are backed whole-heartedly by the people of this city.

From the Stingaree Band there have been seven of its members who have studied or at present are studying to become band directors. 

Texas City, industrial center of the Gulf Coast, is located forty miles south of Houston and fifteen miles north of Galveston, Texas, It is bordered on the south with six large chemical and oil refineries and a tin smelter. The population is 30,000, having doubled in size since the Texas City Disaster of 1947 when over 500 persons lost their lives.

The Texas City Schools are among the most modern in the state. Teacher salaries are tops and a three million dollar high school is under construction, including an air-conditioned band hall costing one hundred and eighteen thousand dollars. The new high school is scheduled for occupancy in September of 1957.

An enlarged band program of the Texas City schools was established ten years ago when Robert started in the sixth grade on clarinet and cornet. In the four elementary schools all beginners are started in the sixth grade on clarinet and cornet. In the seventh grade some are transferred to the different instruments and the seventh grade band is set up. Eighth and ninth graders make up the two Junior High bands. After graduation from Junior High School, all students are auditioned and the best musicians in tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades make up the "Stingaree" concert band. All students are eligible for band instruction and take part in the marching band. Each band in Elementary, Junior and Senior High School is allowed one period per day for band. The students in Junior and Senior High band are also scheduled for section rehearsals before and after school with each section getting one to two section rehearsals a week. About 75% of the band take private lessons from competent instructors.

The teaching staff consists of the following:

Robert L. Renfroe—Director Senior High Band and coordinator of the band program. Graduate of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

William Gaver—Full time assistant and woodwind instructor to the Senior High Band. Graduate of the Eastman School of Music.

Carl D. Meyers—Director of the Seventh Grade and Eighth and Ninth Grade Bands in Blocker Junior High School, Graduate of North Texas State College.

Philip B. Speer—Director of Seventh Grade and Eighth and Ninth Grade Bands in Fry Junior High School. Graduate of Florida State University.

Raymond Wanieck—Director of the four elementary classes in the elementary schools. Graduate of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

Other teachers employed during the year are Mr. Anthony Russo, former clarinetist with the Houston Symphony, Robert Davis, trombonist with the Houston Symphony and Jerry Phiffinger, French Horn, Houston Symphony

The Stingaree band performs at all football games during the year, often representing college and professional teams at their games. The band has been the official representative of Governor Shivers to the Marti-Crass; put on the entire half-time show between the Detroit Tigers and the New York Giants, in the Cotton Bowl; and represented Texas Lions' club at Lions International in Mexico Çity; won First Division in concert and first place in the million dollar parade as a Junior High Band in the tri-state band festival in 1949. The Texas City High School won the sweepstakes in 1954 at the tri-state meet in the Class A competition. Another highlight of the bands was the visit of Edwin Franko Goldman. He directed the two Junior High Bands in rehearsal and directed the Senior High Band in Concert March 18, 1954.

The annual budget for instruments and repairs for the past ten years has run from \$10,000 to \$18,000, all of which is appropriated by the school board from tax revenues. No band parents organization is needed or used. When a special trip is planned, the parents are called together and plans are made for raising the funds necessary. This year the \$8,000 necessary for the Chicago trip was raised in three months.

In addition to school-furnished instruments, many of the students provide their own instruments.

Junior Highs: 12 Sousaphones, 16 single horns, 12 trombones, 10 baritones, 12 flutes, 4 oboes, 4 bassoons, 6 bass clarinets, 4 alto clarinets, 5 alto saxophones, 4 tenor saxophones, 2 baritone saxophones, and 2 sets of percussion.





Bob is a junior in High School and of all the organizations to which he belongs, his DeMolay and Band activities come first. He is past Master Counselor of our Texas City Chapter and his father is Potentate of El Mina Temple.

Tommy Cameron is the other student director of the "Stingaree Band". A fine pianist and a student with a very keen ear is Tommy. He is a Junior and plays Cornet in the Band. Among Tom's many activities is his DeMolay work of which he is presently serving the chapter as Secretary. Tommy is a very fine young person to have around, ready always to do more than his share.





#### ROBERT L. RENFROE

The name of Robert L. Renfroe and that of the Texas City Stingaree Band have become synonymous throughout Texas. Starting at the age of nineteen teaching in the elementary and junior high schools in Texas City, he is in his tenth year with the Texas City Bands. His junior high school bands were accorded the highest honors ever bestowed on junior high school bands in Texas, out-pointing senior high bands of all classifications and being awarded first division honors in concert and first place in the Million Dollar Parade at the Tri-State Band Contest in Oklahoma.

After two years with the junior high bands he moved up to the senior high band and was made director in charge of all bands in the

Texas City schools. Under his ten years of teaching and supervision the band department has developed to the extent that five full time band directors are needed. In addition private teachers from the Houston Symphony are employed to teach privately.

Mr. Renfroe's high school bands have performed throughout Texas. They have represented the Governor at the Mardi Gras in New Orleans, the Texas City Lions at the Lions International Convention at Mexico City, and captured the Grand Sweepstakes Award at the Tri-State in Oklahoma two years ago. They have won seven consecutive Sweepstakes Awards in State Contests. Mr. Renfroe is asked to serve as adjudicator at marching and concert contests in many parts of the state and has served as music chairman in his own Region V of the Interscholastic League Music Division. This year he is organizer of the Texas All-State Sight Reading Band for the Texas Music Educators Convention to be held in Dallas, Texas. He is a charter member of Kappa Kappa Psi Band Fraternity at his Alma Mater. He is a member of American School Band Directors Association, and was a member of the first All-American Bandmasters Band. He and his wife Betty Sue have one son, Robert L., Jr.



#### WILLIAM D. GAVER

A native of Hagerstown, Maryland, William D. Gaver is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music where he was a clarinet student of Rufus Arey and studied flute with Walifred Kujula who is now with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Gaver was an original member of the famed Eastman Symphonic Wind Ensemble for two years under the distinguished conductor Frederick Fennell.

Before coming to Texas City, he spent two years as solo clarinetist with the 97th Army Band at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. During this time, he taught woodwinds and coached ensembles at the Lawton Senior High School, Lawton, Oklahoma.

Mr. Gaver became associated with the Texas City Band Department following his military service, and assumed the position as woodwind instructor and assistant director of the Texas City High School Band. He is currently doing graduate work in woodwinds at the University of Houston where he is a clarinet and flute student of Jeffery Lerner and Byron Hester respectively — both are members of the Houston Symphony.

Mr. Gaver is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Music Fraternity and is a member of this years Second All-American Bandmaster's Band.



Texas City, industrial center of the Gulf Coast, is located forty miles south of Houston and fifteen miles north of Galveston. Texas. It is bordered on the south 30,000, having doubled in size since the Texas City Disaster of 1947 when over 500 persons lost their lives.

The Texas City Schools are among the most modern in the state. Teacher salaries are tops and a three million dollar high school is under construction including an air conditioned band hall costing one hundred and eighteen thousand dollars. The new high school is scheduled for occupancy in September of 1957.

An enlarged band program of the Texas City schools was established ten years ago when Robert Renfroe became director of bands at the age of nineteen. In the four elementary schools all beginners are started in the sixth grade on clarinet and cornet. In the seventh grade some are transferred to the different instruments and the seventh grade band is set up. Eighth and ninth graders make up the two Junior High bands. After graduation from Junior High School all students are auditioned and the best musicians in tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades make up the "Stingaree" concert band. All students are eligible for band instruction and take part in the marching band. Each band in Elementary, Junior and Senior High School are allowed one period per day for band. The students in Junior school with each section getting one to two section rehearsal before and after school with each section getting one to two section rehearsals a week. About 75% of the band take private lessons from competent instructors.

The teaching staff consists of the following:

Robert L. Renfroe — Director Senior High Band and coordinator of the band program. Graduate of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

William Gaver — Full time assistant and woodwind instructor to the Senior High Band. Graduate of the Eastman School of Music.

Carl D. Meyers — Director of the Seventh Grade and Eighth and Ninth Grade Bands in Blocker Junior High School. Graduate of North Texas State College. Philip B. Speer — Director of Seventh Grade and Eighth and Ninth Grade

Bands in Fry Junior High School. Graduate of Florida State University.

Raymond Wanieck — Director of the four elementary classes in the elementary schools. Graduate of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

Other teachers employed during the year are Mr. Anthony Russo, former clarinetist with the Houston Symphony, Robert Davis, trombonist with the Houston Symphony and Jerry Phiffinger, French Horn, Houston Symphony.

The Stingaree Band performs at all football games during the year, often representing college and professional teams at their games. The band has been the official representative of Governor Shivers to the Mardi-Gras; the band put on the entire half time show between the Detroit Tigers and the New York Giants, in the Cotton Bowl; and presented Texas Lions' Club at Lions International in Mexico City. This group won 1st Division in concert and 1st place in million dollar parade as a Junior High Band in tri-state band festival in 1949. The Texas City High School won the sweepstakes in 1954 at the tri-state meet in the class A competition. Another highlight for the bands was the visit of Edwin Franko Goldman, who directed the two Junior High Bands in rehearsal and directed the Senior High Band in concert March 18, 1954.

The annual budget for instruments and repairs for the past ten years has run from \$10,000 to \$18,000, all of which is appropriated by the school board from tax revenues. No band parents organization is needed or used. When a special trip is planned, the parents are called together and plans are made for raising the funds necessary. This year the \$8,000 necessary for the Chicago trip was raised in three months.

# TEXAS CITY PORT OF INDUSTRIAL OPPORTUNITY

Gold Coast of "The Nation" is the term magazine writers are using to describe the fabulously endowed shoreline of Texas.

And using the same descriptive phraseology, Texas City is one of the largest and brightest nuggets that Nature has stored in the fastest growing section of the nation.

Texas City's present five square mile industrial area holds one of the top concentrations of industries in the United States. Some of the Nation's largest chemical, oil, and other industrial concerns have giant plants here with payrolls totaling approximately \$42,000,000 a year, and that figure does not include payrolls for expansion projects.

Here are to be found practically all of the raw materials that such great firms as Carbide and Carbon Chemical Company, Monsanto Chemical Company, American Oil Company, Texas City Chemicals, Inc., American Oil Chemical Company, Republic Oil Refining Company, Texas City Refining, Inc. and Sid Richardson Refining Company, use in the making of a Pandora's box of products to make living easier and cheaper over the world.

Texas City has the only tin smelter in the Western Hemisphere, which was built during World War II when tin smelters in the Dutch East Indies were captured by the Japs.

In this smelter tin ore from South America is made into pig tin bars for manufacture of cans, bronze, solder, bearing metal and many other uses. It was one of the most vital war plants in the Nation during the last war.

Texas City as a deep water port ranks fourth among Texas ports, after Houston, Beaumont and Port Arthur. In 1955, a total of 14,310,112 tons of water-borne commerce were handled through the Port of Texas City. 14,388,797 tons were handled in 1954. For the past several years Texas City has ranked as the eleventh port nationally. This is quite a contrast from 1904 when the first ocean going vessel brought sisal from Mexico and when the total water-borne commerce for that year was 8,712 tons. From that small beginning has sprung the modern city and port of Texas City.

On the outskirts of Texas City there are still swells on the land that are mounds built by the indians who roamed this coastal plain. They contrast strangely with the towers of flame from the stacks of the refineries—beacons of industry that beckon others to follow a trail to a new "Port of Industrial Opportunity".






