TC Band Gets Holland Invitation

The Texas City Stingaree Band has been invited to Holland to represent the United States in the Fourth World Music Festival in Kerkrade next summer, according to Robert Renfroe, director. The invitation was received from Helge W. Leeuwenburgh, the United States representative of the World Music Festval.

The festival is a contest to which invitations are made to outstanding bands, orchestras and bugle corps all over the world, including five continents and 25 countries. This year's festival is now in progress, Renfroe said.

Sponsored by the town of Kerkrade, about 150 miles from Amsterdam, the festival's primary purpose is not entirely musical, but to further understanding among peoples. The invitation stated the competition will be held on the weekends between July 20 and Aug. 15, 1962. During the weekdays concerts will be given by world renowned symphony orchestras and choirs such as the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra, the London Philharmonic and the Vienna Boys' Choir.

The Stingaree Band has performed in the last 14 years throughout Texas, North to Oklahoma and Chicago, East into Lousiana, South as far as Mexico City and West to Austin and San Antonio. Having been national champions three times, it has repeatedly won every contest entered.

Now that the occasion has come for the big one, "every possibility should be explored to see if it is possible to send the band" said Renfroe.

Orville Brandt, president of the Band Parents Club, authorized Renfroe to obtain all the information necessary to plan the trip, Renfroe said.

"Realizing that the government is sending groups obtond to focter good will among all countries," Renfroe said, "I think it wise to try for government transportation." Plans have been set for a conservation with Vice President Lyndon Johnson concerning

Band Day' Concert To Begin Today

The program for the "Band Day" concert, featuring bands from each Texas City public school, has been announced by Robert Renfroe, director of instrumental music for the schools. The concert will begin promptly at 7:30 p.m. today in the high school auditorium with the public cordially invited to attend, Renfroe said.

A highlight of the Stingaree Band's-presentation will be a special arrangement on behalf of the 20-year celebration of Union Carbide Chemicals Company's plant in Texas City, Renfroe said the "1940-41 Medley," complete with narration by Charles Little, high school choir director, tells the story, through music and words, of Carbide's entry into Texas City and its 20 years of growth.

The high school band will also present a selection by a Texas composer, Don Gillis, entitled "Tulsa," a descriptive instrumental of the oil city of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Opening numbers for the concert will be played by the 145piece combined instrumental band classes from the five elementary schools, under the direction of Renfroe.

The two seventh grade bands from Blocker and Levi Fry Junior High Schools will combine to form a 165-piece band, and will present a march entitled "On the Street," by Ted Mesang, and the overture "Balladaire," by Frank Errickson, Clarence Paul and William Gaver will direct the band.

A 155-piece ensemble will be formed by the combination of the Blocker and Levi Fry eighth and ninth grade bands. The band's selections will be "An Occasional Suite" by George Fredrick Handel, directed by Frank La Cava, and "Slavonte Folk Suite" by Alfred Reed, under the direction of Phil Armstrong.

The Stingaree Band will conclude the program, Renfroe said.





Texas City Band Presents Scroll To Director at Groesbeck Concert

Few happier occasions have been held in Groesbeck than when last Friday afternoon Bob Renfroe brought his famed Texas City High School band to his old hometown and school.

A 1943 graduate of Groesbeck High School, Renfroe, who had applied himself well as a band student under Hubert Wendell, entered Sam Houston State in Huntsville, continuing his music studies. Immediately upon graduation in 1947, his fine college record attracted the attention of Texas City school officials. They employed Bob Renfroe and have been happy about it ever since.

Marvin Peterson is an 18-year-old senior at Texas City High School and he talks with a trumpet and with his heart.

Marvin, or "Pete" to all his friends, wants to be a great jazz musician and to form his own jazz orchestra after college. The young Negro is a popular member of the high school marching band.

HE TALKS of the hopes of a talented individual, of music, of God and of people with so great an amount of human insight that one doubts if he is for real.

But there can be no doubting his sincerity Robert Renfroe, director of the high school

band, said Pete is good enough to make living as a jazz trumpeter.

here and gone into music, Pete has the best chance to make it as a performer," Renfroe said.

"Pete is quite a guy. I've never had a nicer or more cooperative kid in the 20 years I've been here."

RENFROE COMPARED Pete to the immortal Louie Armstrong.

'Pete is a great showman, but he is not a smart-aleck. He is very down to earth. He is well thought of and liked by all the kids in school," Renfroe added.

"He is not only a credit to his race, but a credit to all youth."

Pete plans to attend North Texas State University in Denton because his older brother, Willie, is going there now and because of the "fabulous" jazz bands the school produces.

After college he hopes to organize his own 16 piece jazz orchestra.

He said he has the best jazz group on the Gulf Coast now in the "Soul Masters," a seven piece band with a male vocalist.

PETE LEADS the band which has been playing together about two years. The "Soul Masters" play for formals at the Moody Center in Galveston, and is the house band at the I.L.A. Hall, 29th and Market Street, where they play every Friday night after football games.

The band also plays in La Marque and Houston at times and in September played behind Joe Hinton in Lake Charles, La.

Pete became interested in music and started on the drums when he was in the seventh grade.

His mother said the drums made too much racket, however, and about that time he bought some Miles Davis records and turned to the trumpet, "because it has a more exciting sound to it."

Davis is his favorite, followed by Lee Morgan, Dizzy Gillispie and Louie Armstrong. "Louie was great in his time and he has a great heart and everything," Pete said. "But as for playing modern music...

"I admire him for his courage. He just keeps playing and doesn't let his age

ANOTHER FAVORITE in the jazz field is tenor saxophone player John Coltrain.

"I like him because he puts God in his work," Pete said, "His album 'A Love Supreme,' which was voted number one in the jazz polls, shows his tributes to God."

When asked if he considered himself a religious person, Pete replied, "Very much

Pete believes his music has brought him closer to God.

"I get funny feelings sometimes when I'm playing and I don't think it is just

"A lot of boys and girls my age won't admit their love for God. I can't understand

It is startling to hear that kind of talk from a young jazz musician, because one

HE TALKS HONESTLY and straightforward, however, even though his speech is interlaced with words and phrases like "man," "I mean" and "you know."

Pete is quick to give credit to people who have helped him in his efforts.

He said James Wilson, former band director at Booker T. Washington and now director at Central High School, was a great help to him.

Wilson aided him in his chord progressions and strengthened him on solos, Pete said.

"I don't see how he had time to devote all that attention to me." Pete said. "He gave me some million dollar lessons free "

As for his present instructor at Texas City High School, Pete said, 'We need more Mr. Renfroes.'

At this point Pete slipped into the subject of race relations, a problem that seems to bother him more than a little.

"We need more people in the world with common sense," he said.

"When I first came to the high school I had guys throw spitballs at me. Now those guys are my best friends. It's all a matter of thinking and keeping cool.

"YOU CAN TALK TO someone intelligently and if he has any understanding at all, you can work your problems out," he said.

"If the parents, I mean the old-time parents, would keep their ten cents worth out if they can't offer anything constructive












Recently named to the All-Area tryouts, where the All-State Band will be selected on Jan. 24, are eight more Texas City bandsmen, Renfroe said.
