Sting Concert Band Captures AAAA Honor

The Texas City Stingaree Band, for the first time in its history, took the highly coveted AAAADivisionOutstandingConcert Band award Saturday at the annual Buccaneer Day Festival in Corpus Christi.

The Texas City High School Band met competition from about 40 AAAA bands from throughout the State of Texas and four out-of-state bands to take the top award in the two-day event, possibly the biggest band contest in the state, prestige-wise.

"I knew I had my best band in 23 years," Robert Renfroe, Texas City High School Band director, said. "I am completely thrilled and delighted. This was the big one."

According to Renfroe, the Stingaree Band will go after the Six Flags award next week.

"No other band has ever won both awards," Renfroe said, "but I believe this band can do it."

Judging in the Corpus Christi

contest was conducted by W.J. Julian, University of Tennessee; William Rhodes, University of New Mexico; and Ralph Laycock of Utah's Brigham Young University.

According to Renfroe, the Hereford, Texas high school took the award in the AAA division, and Santa Fe High School of the Alta Loma - Arcadia area took AA Division honors.

TC Marches Right Behind Music Man Bob Renfro

TEXAS CITY - Success for Robert Renfro is a string binding him to Texas City rather than catapulting him into the college or professional echelons of band directing.

The energetic director of the big Stingaree Marching Band of Texas City High School affirms rumors he has had offers of college and university bands

This music man, who started building the Texas City public school band program at age 19 in 1947, tells why he declined these offers:

"I guess having started the program myself, starting at such an age, finding the situation here so cooperative, working with a fine board, developing close friendships with people, with former students-

"I find it impossible to leave.

"I have decided I'm going to have one band for my tenure.

"After my daughter, who is 4, leaves the high school band, I will retire."

It isn't hard to like Bob Renfro upon first meeting.

It's easy to see how his zest and enthusiasm are contagious to the kids. And it's obvious his major criticism would be simply that he never slows down.

Renfro has had an unbroken string of award - winning bands for his 23 years with the district, and in those years has developed the system wide band program to feed new talent into the big band at the high school.

A boy from the small town of Groesbeck, about 30 miles from Waco. he came to Texas City the summer of 1947. He began building the band program as the city itself was rebuilding from the great Texas City Disaster, the April 16, 1947, chain of explosions killing more than 500 and doing some \$67 million in property damage.

On April 16 that year he was on tour with a college band in Anahauc. They were to have played Texas City a day or two later, and that performance was shifted to Pasadena after the blasts.

When he finally came to Texas City, it was as a band director for the

He was only 19 years old and hadn't finished college. "You didn't have to have a degree in those days. Band directors were scarce," he

Most probably he would have been an asset to the district with or without the degree, but he did finish his college work through extension and summer study at the University of Houston so he qualified fully as scholatic qualifications changed.

"I came at an optimum time for starting a band program. Lots of the students had lost moms, dads, and others. The schools were ripe for giving to the young kids what is good," he said.

The whole city became caught up in supporting them. Renfro recalls that whenever the junior high (then old Texas City Junior High) band made a trip, it was as if the whole city was following them. They always played to a full house.

Of course, people knew of the blast, but the band soon had a reputation for excellence in its own right, he said.

Renfro's second year here the junior high band received a 99.4 per cent rating in University Interscholastic League concert competition, and took top honors in parade in the national competition at Enid,

This success out of the sorrow of the times is what really sparked the community support for the band program, the director said. He

believes that support continues. "We are most fortunate here to have a school board, and a

community, that does support the band, that funds the program

The band has some fund - raising projects, but these and the booster club activities are needed only for special events such as long trips.

Renfro has the title "director of instrumental music" for the Texas City School District. That puts him in charge of programming. budget, and staff for the department involving about 1,000 students from sixth grade through high school.

He has two junior directors, one at Blocker and one at Levy Fry junior high, and two assistants who handle the teaching of elementary students



The Renfro system begins with the fifth graders.

Music aptitude tests are given fifth graders in May. Invitations to join band are sent to the parents of those showing promise. This coming year there will be about 180 sixth graders training to enter a seventh grade band the next year.

Renfro's chief teaching duties are conducting the three high school bands which combine into the big Stingaree Marching Band, to be 250

The high school students are divided into an advance band, a second band, and a training band for practice and concert work.

Asked his favorite task, Renfro replied, "There is no joy like the first band." These students are advanced to the point where they don't have to march every day and can start off with fine musical

But he can't deny a fascination for the welding of the big band and the training and choreography demanded to get it marching.

This talent was so well displayed last fall at the Band Spectacular, an hour of band routines and music, and at football game appearances.

An affinity for a band seems an inborn thing with the director. As a young school boy he remembers always running to the window when the band marched by. The teachers finally accepted it. "It was just inside me. I just had to get to the window," he smiles.

His family had but an amateur love of music. His mother sang and his sister played piano.

in high school. By college time he had settled on oboe and bassoon as major instruments.

His ability as a band leader has been continuous in the measure of his profession, the competition with other bands.

The Blocker Band this year got its 23rd straight first division in concert at the state UIL contest. That record goes back to the old Texas City Junior High preceding Blocker, and also goes back to Renfro's start here.

The plaques and trophies in the high school band room are all firsts. There is many an UIL first, with nary a second.

The Stingaree Band has won the national sweepstakes at Enid, Okla., three times. It this year won the Bucaneer Festival contest at Corpus Christi, one of the most coveted in the state.

The band won the Six Flags Over Texas Contest several years ago.

A big honor for the Stingaree Band this fall is the invitiation to perform during the Cowboys - Jets game at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas

CBS Television Network has assured uninterupted coverage of their Cotton Bowl performance, an honor to date extended only to the University of Michigan Band.

The Stingaree Band has been televised before, at the Astrodome, but Sept. 13 will be the first time for national television.

Over the years the band has traveled as far as Los Angeles, New Orleans, and Mexico City.

Renfro met his wife, the former Betty Sue Eidom of Port Arthur, when she came to the Texas City district as an English teacher. They now have three children

Their son Robert Jr. will play oboe next year as a sophomore band







TC Symphonic Band Returns

TEXAS CITY — The symphonic band from Texas City High School has returned home after playing to a standing room audience of more than 3,000 music educators from all parts of the nation in Chicago.

Under the direction of Robert Renfroe, director of instrumental music for the school district, the band performed at the annual Mid - West National Band and Orchestra Clinic at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago.

Texas City's band performed at the clinic after competing with other bands in the nation for an invitation to the prestigeous program, Renfro said. After being selected by tape recordings of the group, they were placed in the highly honored position for the Friday evening concert of the five - day clinic, he added.

Following the band's presentation of "Italia Rhapsody," Renfroe said the ovation from the audience included shouts of bravo. Dr. Raymond Dvorak, director emetris of the University of Wisconsin Band and now director of the Mid - West Clinic, acclaimed the band as "presenting the most exquisite display of musicianship ever before presented at the 27 - year old clinic - convention by a high school band."

Renfroe said that music experts from the band world who congratulated the band's performance included Dr. George Wilson from the Interlochen School of Music; Dr. Harry Bergian, director of the University of Illinois Band; Dr. William Revelli, University of Michigan; Dr. Leonard Falcone, Michigan State University; Col. Arnald D. Gabriel, conductor of the U.S. Air Force Band from

Washington, D.C.; Dr. Donald McCathern, Duquesne University; and Dr. James Matthews, University of Houston.

The Texas City band was also selected to participate in a Saturday morning interpretation clinic under the baton of Col. Gabriel. "The band in this clinic is used as a sort of 'guinea pig' role' stated Renfroe, and the group was highly praised by Col. Gabrield and the Mid - West audience.

"The Mid - West appearance by the band was truly the outstanding accomplishment in the long history of the Stingaree Band," Renfroe said, "and I want to thank every citizen, businessman and the Texas City industries for making this trip possible. The students did Texas City proud in showing what the fine arts have to offer young students. Their impact on the Chicago audience will long be remembered."

The band has been offered an invitation to a similar convention in Pittsburg in April of 1975. It has also been re-invited for the third consecutive year to perform in Glion, Switzerland, where tours would be made through Switzerland, Holland, Germany and France if the invitation is accepted.

Renfroe has been asked to become a member of the board of the National Band and Orchestra Association which organizes tours abroad for young musicians. Acceptance of the position would mean that Renfroe would conduct one of the groups in a tour of Europe in two years. The invitation was extended after the band's Chicago performance and was made by Dr. McCathern of Duquense University, president of the association.





Profile: Never put down the horn

"Musicians are funny people—once they play, they don't ever put the horn down."

That's the way Robert Renfroe, Texas City High School Band Director, describes his long music career.

When he was 12, and a student in Groesbeck (near Waco), he first learned to play the bass horn; at Sam Houston State Teachers College in Huntsville he learned all the brass and woodwind instruments.

Now, almost four decades after he first picked up an instrument, he says simply: "I love it."

"All these years I have never had one day when I couldn't wait to get up here to the band hall. It's just that way. When I was a young kid, before I was able to get into the band at Groesbeck, I had to go to the window to watch when I heard the band. Even then I wanted to be a band director."

The only job Renfroe has ever held is the one in Texas City. He accepted a job here when he was 19 and had just finished school at Huntsville. He has now chalked up 29 years.

"When I came here marching was 'the thing' but we have changed the emphasis.

"A man is really marked as a musician by his concert record. Marching is something we do to keep our jobs. If you love it, and I do, then it's easy. But more men in my profession get out of it because of the marching than anything else.

"They like concert music. And you can't hold a job in a public school, or at least the head band directing job, unless you do the marching band. It's just that way."

During each of Renfroe's 29 years here, the Texas City High School Concert Band has earned a first division (the highest) rating in University Interscholastic League competition. Though occasionally he takes the marching band to competition, it is the concert band which year after year brings home the honors. The repetoire includes everything from classical to contemporary since so much of the music has been transcribed for concert bands.

"I prefer the classical music, and nearly everyting classical for the symphonic orchestra has been transcribed for the concert band. Concert bands have really come into their own within the last 10 years and there is a world of fine music composed for them. Now we don't have to lean as much on the orchestra repetoire as we used to.

"Martin Gould and Giannini have written symphonies for bands and the band repetoire is really unique now. Within the past 10 years it has come into its own as serious, fine music."

Texas City has been a band town all these years because there is not a string section in the music department. Renfroe has dreams though of an orchestra in Texas City.

"Texas City has been kind of a band town and I personally want to change that image. We don't have strings in our school system.

"We are anxious to start strings and are hopeful that in a year or so we will initiate a string program, possibly in the fifth or sixth grade. That will require a couple of string teachers, but when we get started, we are really going to push and develop the program."

Audiences at band concerts are as likely to hear classical or patriotic music as they are to hear Simon and Garfunkel. Variety is the rule with the band, and Renfroe is one who finds something good in each style of music.

"I would relate, say, to Benny Goodman and the popular music of the Forties. It still seems to me the best written. My sons wouldn't feel that way. They feel that rock music of today is fine.

"I have some tapes of the Moody Blues and I think it is as fine as anything we heard in the Forties. But what makes it fine is that those fellows sing in tune, and those people who accompany them are artist-musicians. It's just gorgeous.

"I am one who never criticizes or takes issue with what a person likes. What I consider in any music, whether it be orchestral, symphonic, or rock, is that it be played with taste and style."

TC bands break records

TEXAS CITY—Robert Renfroe, director of the Texas City High School bands, is still breaking records. He is ending his 31st year as band director with first division honors in every contest all three TCHS bands have entered this year.

The three concert bands from TCHS returned from state University Interscholastic League contest this past weekend with all first division ratings. Texas City High was the only 4-A school to have three bands place in first division.

The contest marked the 31st consecutive

year the symphony band (composed of older, more advanced students) placed first division in concert sightreading, thus establishing the longest first division concert sightreading record in the state.

The three bands recently accomplished the same feat in the Sea Arama Contest held in Galveston; that was followed by a contest held in Corpus Christi where the two advanced bands (the symphony and concert bands) were entered in the Buccaneer Festival Contest.

"Only Texas City and Richardson had

both bands to earn first division in that event which is considered the toughest contest in the country," Renfroe said.

He reports the three bands include 267 students — 96 in the symphony band, 86 in the concert band and 85 in the training band, which consists of mostly ninth grade students.

Renfroe directs the symphony and training bands; directing the concert band is Dr. John Petersen and assisting the two are James Brannon and Chester

The entire month of April we will be busy with serious concert preparation. Would Mrs. Cook like to hear Variations and Fugue or Vorspielund Libestod from Tristan und Isolde on the march? Concerning Mr. Renfroe's "bigheadedness," again Mrs. Cook is never around Mr. Renfroe and therefore has no right whatsoever to pass judgements. Mr. Renfroe has done more for the Texas Music Educators' Association and for the Texas Bandmasters' Association than any other band director. Over the large years, Mr. Renfroe has received numerous offers befrom various universities. If he cared only about whimself, he would have left long ago. His concern has ever been for the band; and if he wants to have the band play for university band directors, then it is strictly for the band's sake.

Finally, Mrs. Cook states that Mr. Renfroe marches "Not even at the local Band Festivals if he can get out of it." The ignorance of this statement is cself-evident. This was open to the public; were you there, Mrs. Cook?

TC band to rep state in salute

TEXAS CITY—The Texas City High School Band will perform at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. this spring.

The band was selected by the National Federation of Music Clubs to represent the state of Texas during the Bicentennial "Texas Day at JFK" May 26.

An informal gathering Tuesday of about 200 parents of band members gave unanimous approval to a proposal by band director Robert Renfroe that the band make a three-day trip to appear at the function.

Such an excursion earlier received the endorsement of Texas City School Supt. Paul W. Manning.

In a letter to Manning, Kenneth N. Cuthbert, faculty member at North Texas State University's School of Music in Denton and state coordinator for NFMC, wrote "the Texas City band is especially well-qualified to represent our state."

Cuthbert also cited the band's "statewide as well as national reputation" as a factor in his selection.

After granting approval for the trip, Manning wrote Renfroe "This is indeed an honor...my sincerest wishes for an outstanding concert and a most pleasant, entertaining and educational trip."

"This is a great honor," Renfroe told the parents Tuesday. "It's something for us to be very proud of."

Refroe told parents the cost of sending the 115-member band to the concert is estimated at about \$13,890, or \$123 per student.

After much discussion, the group voted to raise about 75 per cent of the cost by sponsoring a special band concert, leaving the students to collect about \$35 each.

The parents also selected a comittee to approach local business concerns for donations.

The students will travel on a chartered airliner, be housed in pairs, and tour the capitol in guided excursions.

The art patrons at the JFK Center - whom we met at a private reception which followed the concert -- could hardly believe that this was "just" a high school band! The president of the Exxon Corp., for one (nost for the reception), and a former administrative assistant to LBJ, for another, were among those wno were among those who were pumping Mayor Emmett Lowry's hand and giving voice to their praise.

Even more impressive (to us) thân that, however, were the faces of the people in the audience during the performance! It was not just "l'exas Day" -- it was truly "Texas City Day at JFK!"

THE TRIP was a tremendous undertaking from the start. It was the first time a local band had to travel by plane, and even more, it was a first flight for most of the band students. Renfroe confided that he was almost sure some of them would beg off, or that some parents would not be conducive to the idea of a plane trip, but to his utter amazement, all those who were scheduled. to go turned

The expedition was a 173 member party -- 115 band students and 58 adult chaperones, band parents, band program staff members, and school executives, plus the mayor and this representative of the Daily Sun.

We left Texas City in a convoy of school buses with police escort to the city limits -- a jaunt which we almost missed -- but we we really prefer not to mention that!

Confusion at the airport was minimal, because our luggage and the band instruments had preceded us. The flight in an American Airlines 707 "Luxury Jet" was smooth sailing and fairly routine, except for the thrill of excitement which ran through the crowd.

The young people were rather keyed up, a little awed by the rush of ground speed on the runway at takeoff, but the moment they felt themselves airborne, their delight was expressed in a spontaneous burst of applause.

Four large tour buses transported us from Dulles Airport to the Hotel Harrington in downtown Washington - a trip which was not nearly as long as the ride from our point of origin to Houston Intercontinental.

School Superintendent Paul Manning pointed out the fact that our route followed the course of the Potomac River. and we recalled the legend that George Washington once threw a silver dollar across that same stream, marveling at such a feat because of its width.

Two days later, while our party was visiting the Lincoln Memorial, Manning came back with a rejoinder on that theme. "I found out now Washington

We and some of the students, too. were most impressed by the collections of Rembrandt and Gova.

On the same tour, we also

visited the Library of Congress. the National Archives, and the Kennedy Center, where we saw a panoramic view of the capitol from the rooftop Terrace Garden. We also passed close at hand to the lighted Lincoln. Washington, and Jefferson Memorials, saw the lighted Capitol dome, the White House, the new Air and Space Museum. the Botannical Gardens, and buildings which nouse different branches of government. And yes, indeed, we did see Watergale, too.



Two additional short concerts performed by the other two Texas City High School concert bands will be presented, conducted by Bob Renfroe and Burley Bowman.




